
After reviewing thoughts addressing substance abuse issues in the community, it has been decided to start a Celebrate Recovery group in the Ogilville area partnering with Ogilville United Methodist Church. The purpose of Celebrate Recovery is to encourage fellowship and

to celebrate God's healing power in lives as people work along the road to recovery and to be accountable to Christ, the church and the model of Celebrate Recovery established by Saddleback Church.

Starting a Celebrate Recovery meeting takes time and commitment to develop a functioning group. OCC's team is in the process of learning all the necessary steps to meet the requirements of starting a meeting and acquiring the material and training for individuals leading various roles in the group.

Once the group has established a meeting time and place in Ogilville, the team will work toward promoting and supporting the meeting. The challenging aspect of this meeting will be that once it is established it must be confidential. Future meeting times will be announced and will be open to anyone that has hurts, hang-ups or habits that require recovery. This allows people with all different kinds of addictions to attend the work recovery programs.

IN THE END...HOPE!

It's not uncommon these days to have at least one movie a year (most of the time several) concerning, in some fashion, the end of the world. Be it a virus that wipes out everyone or some sort of cataclysmic event, most of the films end (no pun intended) very similarly with the characters looking at each other or holding each other as the world erupts in violence or a major explosion. I often ask myself, though, "What makes these films so appealing to watchers and what kind of message do we glean from the hours spent watching?" How we watch these films, if we choose to watch them at all, depends greatly on our viewpoint, especially in how it relates in a biblical sense.

When I watch these films, I often try to come to conclusions about the directors and writers and their overall view of the world. What I reap from their viewpoints often center around love or the opposite end of the spectrum: complete avoidance of any feelings. In the last hours, these individuals desperately search for their loved ones or at least someone who can provide that warm feeling of a friendly embrace if they don't try to alleviate all feelings and iso-

late themselves in some form. This saddens me for many reasons. First, is that because many of these films are made from a non-Christian viewpoint, the only hope presented lies in the arms of another person. I am also saddened by the fact and often subconscious reason these films are often made: there is no hope for humanity because of all the horrible things going on in the world.

So why don't we just sit in a corner, hold onto someone, and let the world destroy itself in some form? What I am getting at here is that from a non-Christ centered view, there is no hope or it only rests in the hands of another individual. From a Christ centered view, we have hope!

If there is anything that I have learned from the book John wrote of his magnificent visions given by God in Revelation, it's there is hope and it rests not in humanity or another individual but in our Savior Jesus Christ. "Now I saw heaven opened, and behold, a white horse. And He who sat on him was called Faithful and True...And He has on His robe and on His thigh a name written: KING OF KINGS AND LORD OF LORDS." (Revelation 19:11,16) Just as

Jesus said that he is not of this world, so too do we not belong to this world because we are his children.

We have hope that no matter how the Lord chooses to take us, whether passing away here on earth or at the glorious second coming of Christ, we will spend eternity with him forever. There will be no more sickness, death, or pain and every tongue will confess the name of Jesus. "Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth has passed away, and the sea was no more. And I saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, 'Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away." (Revelation 21:1-4)

It might be true that the intense, deeply spiritual work of "shepherding the flock" through extremely difficult or serious matters should be reserved for elders and pastors or other very spiritually mature brethren. However, there is an area of shepherding where "the people in the pews" can pastor one another even more effectively than a church leader. It is really a very simple idea that involves "scoping" the audience and hallways to TAKE NOTE of the people you do not see here on any given Sunday. The fact that many church people are often rather set in their ways

about where they sit or what paths they take in navigating the church building makes this task easier for all of us.

So, I make this request. When you notice that someone has been missing "too often," send a note or make a phone call to tell them that you have missed them lately. Always be pleasant and non-accusatory with these contacts. Avoid sounding arrogant or superior. Always begin by asking if perhaps you've just not seen them but they've been here. Inquire about pray-

er needs and let them know you are calling because you care. Most people will respond with a thankful heart because another from their church family cared enough to take that step to contact them in love.

Many members doing this kind of shepherding or "pastoring" will definitely become more and more needed and important as God continues to pour His blessing upon and bringing growth to OCC. It is something that most any member can and should do to help us "close the back door" so people won't




