What Really Counts?

It wasn't long ago that I was on vacation observing a children's card game being played by my 6 year old son and my nieces. The game was going along about as well as one could expect, when all of a sudden one of the participants played a card out of sequence and mistakenly assumed they had won the game. Voices immediately rose in protest. "It's not your turn." "That's not fair." "You can't count that." "It doesn't count." Just before the participants came to blows, fisticuffs were avoided when the young card players heard those most wonderful of words: "It's time to go to the beach."

Wouldn't it be great if all of life's struggles were so easily diffused? Unfortunately, most of our challenges are not so easily resolved or dismissed.

As we loaded the van and headed to the ocean, I was struck by the phrase I had heard... "That doesn't count." I was reminded of Paul's words in his second letter to the Thessalonian Christians where he wrote,

*"With this in mind, we constantly pray for you, **that our God may count you worthy of his calling, and that by his power he may fulfill every good purpose of yours and every act prompted by your faith. We pray this so that the name of our Lord Jesus may be glorified in you, and you in him, according to the grace of our God and the Lord Jesus Christ.**"*

After the card game, it was clear what counted most to 5 and 6 year olds—you have to follow the rules for your win to count and a trip to the ocean is more important than fighting over who was right. But, I couldn't help reflecting on the bigger question—what matters most to God? What counts to God? I recalled the practical example of the sheep and the goats in Matthew 25. Then I pondered Peter's response to the peoples' question, "What should we do?" in Acts chapter two. Of course the twelfth chapter of Romans came to mind, as did the admonition of Ephesians 5:15-20 where

Paul chided Christians to be very careful how they live—not as unwise but as wise, reminding us that we need to make the most of every opportunity. Since we returned home, I have continued to ponder the question of what matters most or what counts most to God. I think it is an important question for personal reflection and direction. So, as I continued to reflect and to search the scriptures, I came upon a particularly informative passage in Galatians 5. Here, Paul conducts and concludes an argument about whether or not gentile Christians must follow the Jewish holiness code. Paul's response is summarized in verse 6, "In Christ Jesus neither circumcision nor uncircumcision has any value. **The only thing that counts is faith expressing itself through love.**" Wow. So simple, but so challenging! So, what does faith expressing itself in love look like? Well, we will explore that next month...

Instead of relentlessly racing forward in our maelstrom of success-seeking and amusement-curating, we would do well to pause and turn our eyes and ears to the world around us and truly listen (which

takes time)." Slowing down provides us the opportunity to truly soak up something meaningful and important. Not only this, but it also checks our pride at the door and forces us to pay attention to others around us. This can provide even greater gifts than we might be able to gratify ourselves with.

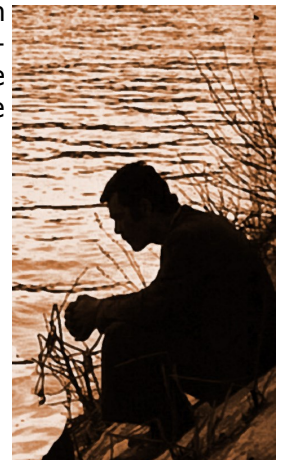

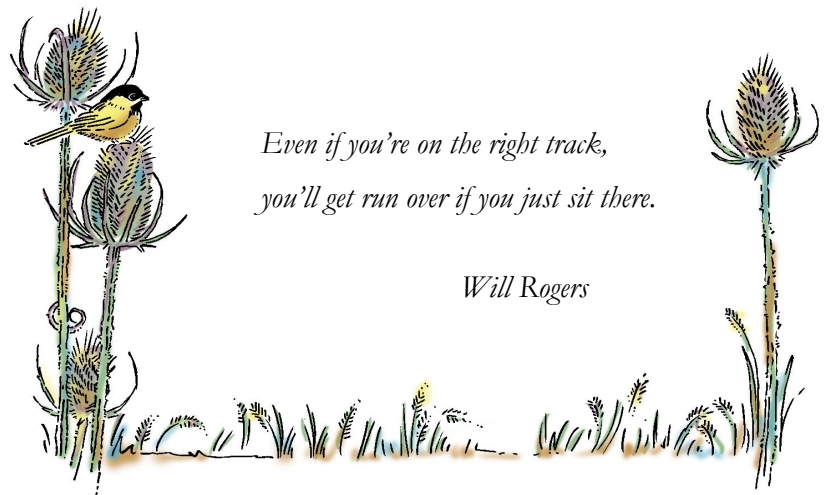
